Throughout this month the library will be promoting the Harry Potter books.





CHILDREN'S MENTAL HEALTH WEEK 6th - 12th February



YEAR 7 READATHON

During World Book Day week, (Mon 27th Feb - Fri 3rd March) Year 7 pupils will be taking part in a sponsored 'Readathon.'

We will be raising money for the charity 'My Wellbeing', which is the local charity that has been set up to support raising awareness about young people's mental health.

Mental wellbeing is always high on the agenda at Pleckgate, as is reading for pleasure. As part of their ongoing education about mental health, pupils in Year 7 heard the moving story of a local primary headteacher who is raising awareness through her work in the field of adolescent mental wellbeing.

The charity uses the sponsor money to provide key rings that show who to contact for support, books that encourage young people to open up about their feelings and water bottles, to share the idea of not bottling up feelings.

To help support this important work, so that it can continue to impact the lives of our young people, pupils can choose to read whatever they want from fiction to non-fiction books as well as comics, recipe books or magazines - it's all about reading for fun.

We hope that the freedom to choose what to read, combined with the knowledge that they are directly helping a local charity will encourage pupils to get involved.

YEAR 8 READATHON

During World Book Day week, (Mon 27th Feb - Fri 3rd March) Year 8 pupils will be taking part in a sponsored 'Readathon.'

We will be raising money for the charity 'Read for Good.' The charity provides a regular supply of brand-new books and a resident storyteller to every major children's hospital in the UK.

School will also receive 20% of the money raised to spend on books for our own library.

Pupils can choose whatever they want to read from fiction to non-fiction books as well as comics, recipe books or magazines - it's all about reading for fun.

We are asking family and friends to sponsor pupils. The sponsor money can be paid into school by parents via ParentPay.

There will be a special reward for the top fundraisers in each year group.

But when Mr Silver disappears, and a shadow from the past threatens everything, the Emporium and all its wonders begin to crumble.


Can Daniel save his home, and his new friends, before the Nowhere Emporium is destroyed forever?

YEAR 8


Felix has been living in an orphanage for three years and eight months when the men in armbands arrive to burn the books.

The Raven Boys by Maggie Stiefvater

Blue has spent the majority of her sixteen years being told that if she kisses her true love, he will die. Determined to find out the truth, Blue becomes involved with the Raven Boys, four boys from the local private school (lead by Gansey) who are on a quest to discover Glendower - a lost ancient Welsh King who is buried somewhere along the Virginia ley line. Whoever finds him will be granted a supernatural favour. Never before has Blue felt such magic around her. But is Gansey her true love? She can't imagine a time she would feel like that, and she is adamant not to be the reason for his death. Where will fate lead them?
