


Throughout this month we will be promoting books which focus on these communities.



















A.I.M HIGH WRITING DAY



Everyone thinks I'm a failure. But then he sees me. The coyote, eyes golden and wild. And I guess it's because someone's watching me, but I start to dance.


YEAR 8

Thirty-five beautiful girls. Thirty-five beautiful rivals...


