Dr Chris Hines MBE visits Pleckgate!

Environmentalist Dr Chris Hines MBE has inspired our Eco-Club to be a force for change.

Chris took time out of his busy schedule to spend a day with the Eco-Club looking at the school and helping them suggest changes which will make the school 'greener.'

Chris, who has spent 30 years championing environmental causes, said: "It's been a pleasure to be here and talk to pupils about the challenges but also about finding solutions, which is important. It's important to create a future where plants, animals and people live in harmony."

Chris spoke at a Year 7 assembly about sustainability, looking at ways our school can be more energy efficient and ways to reduce the school's carbon footprint.

The Eco-Club pupils interviewed the school's Business Manager Mr Clark and Site Supervisor Mr Holden about the sustainability of the school. They questioned them about solar panels, waste water, recycling, LED light bulbs and generally about saving energy and reducing waste in school.

Pupil Nimra said: "I joined the Eco-Club because I want to help the planet and implement change to do this."



Our Anti-Bullying Ambassadors

Our Anti-Bullying Ambassadors are a visible presence at Pleckgate to help anyone who may feel they need to talk.

The Year 10s wear purple badges and also lanyards and can be seen in the Year 7 and 8 school yards at breaks and lunch-times.



Fatima said: "It's all about giving that bit of extra help. It may be pupils who are too scared to approach a teacher but would feel comfortable talking to another pupil if they have any issues or problems. It's a safe space so people don't keep things bottled up."

Hadia said: "I chose to be an Anti-Bullying Ambassador because I want everyone to feel safe and comfortable."

The Anti-Bullying Ambassadors were originally trained through The Diana Award, in memory of Princess Diana, which is about empowering young people to make positive change.

Our current School Ambassadors will also train the Year 9s to step up into their role in the next school year.

Medical Mavericks visit Pleckgate High School

Our pupils got to test their blood pressure, see if they have a steady hand for keyhole surgery and take (fake!) blood when Medical Mavericks came into school.

Medical Mavericks aim to inspire the next generation of medics and scientists by taking real medical and sports science equipment into schools. Science and Technology teacher Mr Ainsworth, who also is the STEM coordinator, oversaw the sessions for all year groups.

"Medical Mavericks help to raise awareness of the different careers in the NHS with workshops in school which pupils can have a go at."

"There is an ultrasound machine, an ECG machine, stethoscopes, testing blood pressure, goggles to test their eyes and also 'beer' goggles to look at how alcohol affects eyesight and balance as well as taking fake blood."

"There is also a machine where pupils can mimic keyhole surgery. It's really exciting for pupils to try out all these activities and can help them look at the different career paths they can take in medicine."



Year 9 Aaminah said: "I have had an ECG and everything is absolutely fine! It's been a good experience."

Daisy Leigh from Medical Mavericks said: "We host a lot of workshops to highlight careers in the NHS and show it's not just doctors and nurses. We also want to show that a lot of these careers are achievable for most pupils."

Chris has campaigned for the environment for more than 30 years and inspired positive change. He was given an MBE for services to the environment in 2008.

Chris, whose mother-in-law Judith Mallam, used to teach Maths at Pleckgate, spoke about his 'Surfers Against Sewage' campaign to the parents, pupils and the staff.

He explained how it started out as a small group of surfers campaigning for cleaner waters and they found a solution to stop raw sewage going straight into the sea and this was implemented in the UK.

"We have to create a better world and hopefully the Pleckgate pupils can help do that as everyone can do their bit. It has a ripple effect that someone in Blackburn making a positive change can help people across the world."

It was an inspirational talk and Chris then presented awards to the Class of 2024 – those who left in July – and also the current Year 8-11s.

Headteacher Mrs McGinty said: "We have decided to do something different this year in recognising the achievements of pupils in all year groups. This is in academic success as well as leadership, progress, success and more. It was such a rewarding occasion, we are so proud of all our pupils".

PE teacher Mrs Ryding said: "They have done really well in what is a difficult league. I am proud of them all."


Year 11 football championships
